18,047 students served in twelve counties 755 classrooms in 109 schools 97,056 contact hours 470 volunteers



Junior Achievement (JA) is a non-profit organization that partners with volunteers from the community to teach elementary students about their roles as individuals, workers and consumers, and to prepare middle and high school students for key economic and workforce issues they will face.

Junior Achievement's (JA) mission of inspiring and preparing young people to succeed in a global economy was never more important than during the last few years of economic upheaval. Yet, developing financially responsible, workforce-ready and entrepreneurially savvy generations to help grow our country's economy requires a strategic and sustained approach.

JA empowers young people to own their future economic success. Our programs help prepare young people for the real world by showing them how to generate wealth and effectively manage it, how to create jobs which make their communities more robust, and how to apply entrepreneurial thinking in the workplace.

During 2012, JA's locally produced financial literacy curriculum was taught to approximately 2,800 7th grade students in Fayette, Scott, Franklin, Jessamine and Madison counties. This six-lesson program teaches students about budgeting, investing, banking accounts and services, debit/credit, credit score/ history and taxes.

The teachers at Henry Clay High School utilized our "Real Jobs, Real World" curriculum for the school's entire freshman class. This program, developed by JA of Kentuckiana (Louisville), guides students through their career-searching process - from high school, to post-secondary education, to employment. They learn specifically about 100 "hot jobs" that represent the region's top workforce needs.



Of the 18,047 students that were served by Junior Achievement of the Bluegrass during the 2011-2012 school year, 12,235 were elementary grade boys and girls. This student number represents 528 classrooms in 81 schools, located in ten counties throughout the Bluegrass region.



In conjunction with the Fayette County Public Schools (FCPS), Junior Achievement of the Bluegrass (JA) made the decision to develop a financial literacy curriculum for seventh grade students throughout the district. Fayette County Public School's Vision 2020 initiative recognized that financial literacy education should become an integral part of the educational programs at all grade levels and across the curriculum. With the endorsement of FCPS Superintendent Stu Silberman, JA's locally produced curriculum was introduced as a pilot program in the fall of 2008 and implemented throughout the district in 2009.

The goal of this six-week financial literacy program is to introduce students to important life skills and concepts such as budgeting, banking, understanding the difference between debit and credit cards, using credit responsibly, financial planning as well as investments such as stocks, bonds and other securities. This JA curriculum is taught

by volunteers from the Central Kentucky business community who also share their own knowledge and expertise with the students. Since financial literacy education is not mandated in schools today - students will only receive this education by participating in a Junior Achievement program. JA of the Bluegrass is also working to develop a financial literacy curriculum for all ninth grade students that will build on the concepts introduced during their seventh grade experience.

"We were talking about buying the TV from Walmart on credit. The students did not understand not paying cash for the TV. I asked the students, what if you don't have the \$378 to buy the TV? One young lady responded, "You don't buy the TV". That is financial literacy—understanding that you do not buy what you can not afford."








2012 BLUEGRASS BUSINESS HALL OF FAME EVENT

Since 1989, Junior Achievement's Bluegrass Business Hall of Fame has annually recognized the esteemed leaders of the Central Kentucky business community. To be considered as a Hall of Fame member, an individual's record of business achievement must demonstrate:

- 1) courageous thinking and actions
- 2) vision and innovation;
- 3) business excellence
- 4) inspiring leadership, and
- 5) community mindedness.

In addition, nominees must serve as a role model for those who follow. Stated more simply, Bluegrass Business Hall of Fame members are individuals whose work has moved the Central Kentucky community in a better, stronger direction. Laureates may be selected from three broad categories: Historical Laureates (deceased), Contemporary/ Active (individuals still engaged in the day-to-day activities of their businesses), and Contemporary/ Retired (individuals who have retired from active business involvement).

















ADOPT-A-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Adopt-A-School program allows companies to partner with a particular school by funding at least ten classes—impacting as many as 200 students through JA's financial literacy and work readiness curriculum. The companies underwrite the program materials for each classroom, along with the volunteer training, support and evaluation. When possible, the sponsoring company offers 10-12 classroom volunteers to deliver the JA programs.
