



Work Readiness

• Enhancing the Relevance

JA of the Bluegrass "DELIVERS" for our local schools -

In conjunction with the Fayette County Public Schools (FCPS), Junior Achievement of the Bluegrass (JA) made the decision to develop the *JA Financial Literacy* curriculum for seventh grade students throughout the district.

Fayette County Public School's Vision 2020 initiative recognized that financial literacy education should become an integral part of the educational programs at all grade levels and across the curriculum.

With the endorsement of then FCPS Superintendent
Stu Silberman, JA's locally produced curriculum was
introduced as a pilot program in the fall of 2008 and
implemented throughout the district in 2009. The goal of this
six-week financial literacy program is to introduce students
to important life skills and concepts such as budgeting,
banking, understanding the difference between debit and
credit cards, using credit responsibly, financial planning
as well as investments such as stocks, bonds and other
securities. This JA curriculum is taught by volunteers from the
Central Kentucky business community who also share their own
knowledge and expertise with the students.

Another way that JA of the Bluegrass is using locally developed programs to fill a gap in the school curriculum is the use of the *JA Real Jobs, Real World* curriculum. This program, developed by the JA Kentuckiana office in Louisville, teaches college and career readiness to students in the late middle to early high school years. This curriculum,

which supports the Kentucky Department of Education's *Career Cruising*

program, allows local JA Volunteers to serve as real-world career guides as they help students connect classroom career-exploration activities with jobs found in Kentucky's economy. Students learn about the 100 "hot jobs" that represents the region's top workforce needs, as well as important ways to prepare for the job market as they complete their high school education.


The *JA Financial Literacy* and the *JA Real Jobs*, *Real World* curricula are excellent examples of how JA of the Bluegrass is going the "extra mile" to provide our local schools with the economic based education programs that will take their students into the economy of the future.



2013 BLUEGRASS BUSINESS HALL OF FAME EVENT

The 2013 Hall of Fame Celebration, presented by Stoll Keenon Ogden PLLC, was held on May 31st at Keeneland.

Three outstanding business and community leaders – **Coach John** Calipari, Nick Nicholson and Elmer Whitaker – officially joined this prestigious group of men and women who have been honored for achievement in their careers, service to the community and their part as role models for our youth. In addition, **Ann McBrayer** was honored with the Warren W. Rosenthal Lifetime Achievement Award in recognition of her countless contributions of time and financial investments to JA of the Bluegrass, Ann Giles (daughter of Hall of Fame member, the late Irving Rosenstein), accepted the award on Ann McBrayer's behalf.

Since 1989, Junior Achievement's Bluegrass Business Hall of Fame has annually recognized the esteemed leaders of the Central Kentucky business community. To be considered as a Hall of Fame member, an individual's record of business achievement must demonstrate:

- 1) courageous thinking and actions
- 2) vision and innovation;
- 4) inspiring leadership, and
- 5) community mindedness.
- 3) business excellence

Bluegrass Business Hall of Fame members are individuals whose work has moved the Central Kentucky community in a better, stronger direction. Laureates may be selected from three broad categories: Historical Laureates (deceased), Contemporary/ Active (individuals still engaged in the day-to-day activities of their businesses), and Contemporary/Retired (individuals who have retired from active business involvement).

















ADOPT-A-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Adopt-A-School program allows companies to partner with a particular school by funding at least ten classes—impacting as many as 200 students through JA's financial literacy and work readiness curriculum. The companies underwrite the program materials for each classroom, along with the volunteer training, support and evaluation. When possible, the sponsoring company offers 10-12 classroom volunteers to deliver the JA programs.
