



Presented by UK Federal Credit Union, JA Miss Business included 70 students representing high schools

in Fayette, Scott and Madison counties. During the day-long program, students participated in professional development activities such as Interviewing 101, Developing their Personal Brand, Social Media Etiquette, Dress for Success Fashion Show and Creating a Vision Board. In addition, each student wrote a letter to themselves to be opened one year from that day illustrating their dreams and goals.

This is not an annual award, but one that is given to recognize only those individuals who have donated generously to Junior Achievement, both in time and monetary contributions.

Warren W. Rosenthal is a past President of the Board of JA of the Bluegrass. In 1979, he became the first recipient of the National Leadership Award given by Junior Achievement to lay leadership volunteers who have performed outstanding services for Junior Achievement. Since the inception of JA of the Bluegrass in 1963, Mr. Rosenthal has donated countless hours of service and hundreds of thousands of dollars to promote the success of JA.

JA Student Perspective

During each Hall of Fame Celebration, we ask one of our students to speak to the audience about their JA experience. Below are excerpts from this year's student speech:

"Good evening. My name is Jaxson Howard and I am a 6th grader at Jessie Clark Middle School. Last fall a JA volunteer, Mrs. Miller, came and spoke to our class. She talked with us about business relations, both domestic



and international trade, the financial aspects of running a business, and some of the normal operations of a business. She highlighted

some positives and negatives of being a business owner also. We did activities on trading goods and services and how they are used and also learned how to calculate the net gain/loss of a business. I thought this was very beneficial to everyone in my class because as we get older it is essential to understand how businesses work and a good starting lesson as to how the economy we live and work in operates.

I also wanted to speak about my experience at JA BizTown when I was in 5th grade at Stonewall Elementary. JA BizTown is a great way for kids to see what having a real job, managing money, paying bills as well as running a business. The first day we were at BizTown I was the town DeeJay and the second day we were there I was a Physician. While these were very different occupations they each were very valued in the community and vital to how it operated. We received our own debit cards and checks and got paid like we were on a real job. It really helped me to understand the basics of a normal day in the life of a real adult. This was an experience that I will definitely not forget.

Thank you for listening to me this evening and I hope you all know how honored I am to be able to share my experiences with you!"



JA USA Rising Star Award
